Renewables alone won't do the job

Electric co-ops are working hard to secure the promise of renewable energy. Today, nearly 90 percent of the nation's electric co-ops provide electricity produced by renewable resources.

Lynches River Electric Cooperative and 19 other South Carolina co-ops offer members a chance to buy Green Power, most of which is generated using naturally occurring landfill gas as a fuel. Green Power is more expensive than standard co-op service because it costs much more to generate electricity from renewable resources than by using conventional fuels such as coal, natural gas or nuclear fission. The co-ops offer Green Power in conjunction with their chief power supplier, the state-owned utility Santee Cooper.

Santee Cooper's Board of Directors recently authorized the utility to contract for purchased biomass power. Biomass, which includes waste from logging operations, was one of the most promising renewable resources in the state, as identified in a cooperative-sponsored study of current available options.

Both efforts show how the co-ops and their chief power supplier are committed to renewable resources. Other forms of renewable power generation, such as wind and solar power, are being studied and even put into practice in projects such as the Green Power Solar Schools effort. However, using renewable resources on a large scale poses special challenges.

Transmission: Renewable resources are abundant in rural areas, but that also means they're located far from the concentrated power needs of population centers — cities and towns. To move electric generation from renewable sources such as wind farms, new transmission lines need to be built to enable a greater availability of renewable power sources.

Intermittency: Most renewable sources are intermittent; the wind doesn't

always blow, and the sun doesn't always shine. Back in February in Texas, more than 80 percent of the state's wind turbine energy went offline when a North Texas cold front stilled the air. Technology offers solutions, of course, but more government funding is needed to pay for the research to find those right technologies. For instance, improved storage system technology would make it possible to store electricity produced by a wind turbine or solar system. When the wind dies down or a storm cloud rolls up, stored power could be ready and waiting. Electric co-ops are studying ways to boost storage technology, although major breakthroughs have yet to be made.

Increased costs and delays:

Construction costs for power plants of all types are rising, and renewable sources are no exception. Three years ago, a wind farm would cost about \$1,000 per kilowatt of capacity to build; today, that cost has doubled. In addition to increased costs, the skyrocketing demand for wind turbines has led to a manufacturing backlog of two years or more. For generating facilities using solar panels, cost for installation and operation can run five times higher than costs for a traditional coal plant of a comparable size.

South Carolina's co-ops and Santee Cooper will need 1,704 additional megawatts in the next decade to meet the needs of our state, one of the nation's fastest-growing. We will continue to pursue renewable resources, along with all other available sources of energy, to meet those needs.

Current climate change theories suggest carbon dioxide (CO2) and other greenhouse gases from power plants and other sources are causing Earth to warm. You've been told CO2 emissions are bad, but no one has told you the cost to reduce them, or even if it is possible.

Actions to lower emissions from power plants are a very serious issue that threatens to have a big economic impact on electricity

consumers — greater than any other issue with which we have ever dealt. Current proposals in Congress to curb emissions, according to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, could cost families as much as \$4,000 per year. The Electric Power Research Institute estimates the cost to the U.S. economy could be nearly \$3 trillion — doubling or even tripling electric bills.

Electrical safety tip

Stay grounded

If you cut off the ground prong or use a "cheater plug" to plug a three-prong appliance into a two-prong outlet, the appliance will still operate. However, you will have disabled an important safety feature that protects you from electric shock if a wire comes loose.

Chauncey K. Gregory, a four-term Senator, has represented constituents in Lancaster and York counties since 1992. Gregory is a native of Lancaster and resides there with his wife, Sherri. The couple have two children, Marshall and Ellen Gray.

Gregory earned his Bachelor of Science degree from the University of South Carolina and is the president of Builders Supply Company in Lancaster. He is a member of First Presbyterian Church.

Highlights of Gregory's political career include ridding the state of video poker and working toward restructuring the state government to give the governor more power and, therefore, greater accountability for the successes and failures of the state.

Gregory is chairman of the Senate Fish, Game and Forestry committee, which oversees the South Carolina Department of

Natural Resources. Additionally, Gregory serves on the Education, Judiciary, and Corrections and Penology committees.

We recently had the opportunity to talk with Senator Gregory, and ask his opinion on issues affecting South Carolinians and District 16.

What are your main concerns for South Carolina and the residents in your district?

One of my primary goals is to change our disjointed and decentralized government structure to one with the appropriate amount of power vested in the executive branch. Also, I'm concerned about high unemployment in the area south of Indian Land and the poor condition of South Carolina's rural roads.

What were some of your objectives in the last legislative session? One important objective was to increase the cigarette tax, which is currently less than 5 percent of the national average.

How have your education and professional background helped you as a legislator? Operating a business is beneficial. We need more people with a

business background serving in the General Assembly.

What are some of the positive aspects of your district?

Our close proximity to Charlotte is ideal. We can enjoy the amenities of a big city while still maintaining the benefits and values of a small town.

What do you enjoy most about being a legislator? I look forward to electric co-op events in Columbia. I enjoy meeting with co-op leaders and listening to their concerns.

Lynches River appreciates Senator Gregory for taking the time to share his thoughts, and we extend our sincere thanks to him for supporting Lynch River Electric Cooperative's efforts to improve the quality of life of our members and communities.

Senator Gregory is not seeking reelection. We thank Senator Gregory for his 17 years of service to his constituents in District 16. ♣

CFL story 'has legs' — but it's misleading

The story of a Maine resident who received a clean-up cost estimate of more than \$2,000 by shattering a single compact fluorescent light bulb (CFL) in her home has taken on the characteristics of an urban myth. There's a catch to this "myth," however: It's partly true but 100-percent misleading.

Yet, the story, as they say in the news business, "has legs." It first appeared in the Ellsworth (Maine) American but was soon picked up by Canada's National Post and the Washington Times and, more recently, by NBC News.

The catch? The resident's enormous bill resulted from bad advice, a point omitted in many retellings. She also did not pay the \$2,000 she was quoted. She sealed up the room until the Maine Department of Environmental Protection came to test the

area. At the resident's request, the department removed a piece of carpet where the bulb had broken. She paid nothing for the clean-up.

No haz-mat suits needed

The truth is, like with many household products, the use and disposal of CFLs requires common-sense precautions. There's no need, as the woman was told, to call a hazardous materials clean-up service.

The extremely small amount of mercury in CFLs poses a minimal risk, experts say. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) says one CFL contains a hundred times less mercury than is found in a single dental amalgam filling or old-style glass thermometer.

Sound advice

Broken CFLs can easily be cleaned up at home. Here's sound advice from

DoTheLightSwitch.com:

How should I clean up a broken CFL?

If a CFL breaks in your home, open nearby windows and leave the room (restrict access) for at least 15 minutes to disperse any vapor that may escape, carefully sweep up the fragments (do not use your hands) and wipe the area with a disposable paper towel to remove all glass fragments. Do not use a vacuum. Place all fragments and cleaning materials in two sealed plastic bags and put into the outside trash.
